We use "either ...or" to talk about two or more possibilities or choices, which are mutually exclusive, i.e. if you choose one you cannot choose the others. Examples:

- You can have either a yoghurt or a banana with the meal.
- It is very easy to decide. You must say either yes or no.
- Either help us or get out of the way.
- Either you drive to the airport or you get a taxi.



## (OR

The conjunction"OR" is not as restrictive as "either...or". We can use it to talk about two or more choices whether they are mutually exclusive or not.
Examples:

- Would you like ketchup or mustard with that?
( I can have ketchup, mustard, or both)
- Which colour do you like - blue, red, black, or white?
( You might like blue, red, black, white or any or all of them)
- I'd like to buy a Laptop or a tablet. (I can buy a laptop, a tablet, or both)
