

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QUITE A FEW (also a good few/not a few):

(used with plural countable nouns)

A fairly large number

- I know quite a few people who have had the same problem.
- Quite a few towns are now banning cars from their shopping centres.
- She must have cooked a good few dinners over the years.
- There were hundreds of protesters, not a few of whom were women.

There were quite a lot of people waiting!





QUITE A LOT (also a good lot of):

(used with both countable and uncountable nouns)

A fairly large number or amount.

• My life has changed quite a lot since I went back to school.

quite a lot of

- They drank quite a lot of wine.
- My job involves quite a lot of travel.

Í've won quite a bit of money in



QUITE A BIT (also a good bit):

(used with uncountable nouns)

A fairly large amount or to a fairly large degree.

He knows quite a bit about painting.

quite a bit of

- I expect you do quite a bit of travelling?
- It took me quite a bit of time to read this book.

quite a bit more/less/ + comparative adjective(-er)

- They're worth quite a bit more than I thought.
- She's quite a bit older than you, isn't she?
