INTERESTED IN [+ NG]

(possible involvement in sth)

I'm interested in doing something = I'm thinking of doing it, I would like to do it:

- Let me know if you're interested in joining the club.
- I tried to sell my car, but nobody was interested in buying it.
- She is interested in starting her own business.

Interested in + noun

- Joe's always been interested in politics.
- I've always been interested in music.

INTERESTED [+ to infinitive]

(wanting to know more about sth)

I was interested to hear/see/know something = it was interesting for me.

- I was <u>interested to hear</u> that Tanya left her job.
- (= I heard this and it was interesting for me)
- I'll ask Mike for his opinion.
 I would be <u>interested to</u> <u>know</u> what he thinks.
- (= it would be interesting for me to know what he thinks)
- I'd be <u>interested to learn</u> why he likes her.

<u>Important</u>

"Interested to" can be used only with verbs of perception and "knowing", such as: see, hear, read, learn, know, find out, ...
