THE FORMER & THE LATTI

In formal English, we use the terms "the former" and "the latter" to refer back to the first and last item of a set respectively.

The following mnemonic will help you to remember the difference:

Former = First / Latter = Last

Examples:

- My boss offered me more money or a company car and I chose the former. (I chose more money)
- My son has done very well in both schoolwork and martial arts, and has won a number of competitions in the latter. (in martial arts)
- Given the choice between being right or being kind, I would most certainly choose the latter. (I'd choose being kind)

Important note:

Never use "the former" and/or "the latter" after a list of more than two items.

Examples:

My hobbies are playing football, training with weights, and dancing, but the former is my true passion. INCORRECT

My hobbies are playing football, training with weights, and dancing, but the **first** is my true passion. **CORRECT**
