- Although not a cure, it goes a long way towards making the patient's life tolerable.
- Your contributions will go a long way towards helping children in need

## Go a long way : (of money, food, etc.) to last a long time

- She seems to make her money go a long way.
- Be careful with that curry, a little bit goes a long way.
- A little of her goes a long way. (ironic)

## Have a long way to go :

to need to do a lot more before you are successful

- We've raised £100 so far, but we still have a long way to go.
- She still has a long way to go before she's fully fit.

## By a long way : by a great amount; by far.

- We were the best team by a long way.
- It was, by a long way, the worst meeting I have ever attended.

## Be a long way : at a great distance, far away

- It's a long way to Tokyo from here.
- The school was a long way from his home.

## Be a long way from sth :

to be completely different from sth

- The price is a long way from what we agreed.
- Most blogs are written in an informal, conversational style that is a long way from what you'd see in a newspaper or magazine.

## Come a long way :

to improve a lot, or to make a lot of progress

- Psychiatry has come a long way since the 1920s.
- The company has come a long way since its humble beginnings.
