ADDING EMPHASIS : “such a/an + adj + [noun]” / “such a/an + adj + [noun] that”

It was	such	no a/an before uncountable nouns	nice	weather	that	we spent the whole day on the beach.
They are	such	no a/an before plural nouns	nice	people.		
	INVERSION					
	such	verb	noun		that	
	Such	was	the violence	of the explosion	that	three buildings collapsed.

ADDING EMPHASIS :

“so [adjective] a/an [noun] that ” / “too [adjective] a/an [noun] to ” / “how [adjective] a/an [noun] ”

	so	adjective	a/an	noun	that	
He is	so	interesting	a	man	that	everybody listens to him.
	too	adjective	a/an	noun		
She's	too	nice	a	girl		to refuse
	how	adjective	a/an	noun		
We'll see	how	good	a	salesman		he really is.

MAKING COMPARISONS : “not so / (not) as [adjective] a/an [noun] as ”

not so / (not) as	adjective	a/an	noun	as	
It's as	exciting	a	story	as	you'll ever read.
She isn't as	good	a	singer	as	she thinks.
He's not so	good	a	player	as	he used to be.
