



COUPLED WITH SOMEONE OR SOMETHING **EN CONJUNTO CON** (X + Y = Z)

Link or combine (something) with something else:

That incident, **coupled with** his behavior yesterday, is a clear sign of his instability.

Coupled with other concerns, the manner in which the government has handled this whole issue has left most people puzzled.

TOGETHER WITH SOMEONE OR SOMETHING

JUNTO A / SUMADO A / X SAME VALUE AS Y

In the company of; also, in addition to.

The lawyer found the will, **together with** other papers, in the murdered man's files.

The cost of food **together with** drinks and prizes made it an expensive party.



He arrived at the theater **together with** his girlfriend.

ALONG WITH SOMEONE OR SOMETHING **ADEMÁS DE / JUNTO A**

Y DID STH ALONG WITH X = X IS MORE IMPORTANT THAN Y

in addition to someone or something; together with someone or something.

We went to the party **along with** David.

I ate some chocolates **along with** some fruit.

1. In association with.

For his second birthday we sent him a fireman's hat, **along with** some books.

2. In conjunction with, as in

Along with what I told you before, that's the whole story of what happened. She keeps her pills in her bag, **along with** her money and her comb and lipstick and the usual junk.



We went to the party **along with** DAVID

ALONGSIDE SOMEONE OR SOMETHING / **JUNTO A / AL LADO DE**

Next to, or together with:

A car pulled up **alongside** (ours).

The new pill will be used **alongside** existing medicines.

Most of the staff refused to work **alongside** the new team.

The UK fought **alongside** France, Turkey, and Sardinia during the Crimean War.

As a preposition, alongside means 'close beside', 'next to' or 'together with':

The trees **alongside** the fence have all been damaged by the wind. (near)

Put your bike **alongside** mine. (next to)

I find it difficult to cope with this illness **alongside** all my other problems. (together with)



"He said I couldn't fire him because he knew where the bodies were buried. Bury him **alongside** the others."

We also use alongside as an adverb, meaning 'along the side of' or 'next to' something:

I parked my car in the drive and William parked his **alongside**.

Informal. alongside of, compared with:

AL LADO DE / COMPARADO CON

Alongside of his brother, he is no student at all.

My car doesn't look like much **alongside** Dad's.

Our profits seem small **alongside** the amounts that the big companies make.
