Meaning: to avoid doing something

DUCK GET COP WRIGGLE

OUT OF something doing something

DUCK OUT OF: to avoid doing something that you were intending to do or had promised to do.

- It's his turn to cook dinner, but I bet he'll try to duck out of it.
- You can't <u>duck out of</u> your responsibilities.

GET OUT OF: to avoid doing something that you should do or that you said you would do

- I said I'd meet him, but now I want to get out of it.
- Ruth always tries to <u>get out of</u> doing the washing up.

COP OUT (OF): to avoid doing something that you should do because it is difficult.

- He has **copped out of** his responsibilities.
- She **copped out of** the parachute jump at the last minute with some feeble excuse.

WRIGGLE OUT OF: to avoid doing something by making excuses.

- Don't try and wriggle out of doing your homework.
- He tried desperately to <u>wriggle out of</u> giving a clear answer.
