# SPECULATION & DEDUCTION ABOUT THE PAST

We can use modal verbs to speculate or guess if something is true using the available information. The modal verb we choose will depend on how certain we are about the possibility. This table will help you understand how to use modal verbs to make deductions about the past.


There is a chance that she was lying to you.

I think she got a taxi home, but I'm not sure.

## MAY MIGHT COULD

have + past participle (+ ing) have been + past participle

It's possible that something happen or was true in the past.

# MUST

have + past participle (+ ing) have been + past participle

We feel sure that something happened or was true in the past, or it was the only realistic possibility.
