



NOTABLE vs

NOTABLE (adj): worthy of distinction, widely known. **NOTABLE/ DISTINGUIDO**

- Henry Ford was a **notable** American industrialist.
- The award was for the writer who made the most **notable** contribution to British literature.
- Being able to have a fluent conversation in Spanish, after only six months of learning is a **notable** achievement.

1) NOTABLE (adj): Unusual or interesting enough to be mentioned or noticed. **CONSIDERABLE**

- Growth in most of the other advanced economies, with the **notable** exception of the UK, picked up in the first half of 2017.
- The directing shortlist has received criticism for its **notable** lack of female filmmakers.

3) NOTABLE (noun): a person of note. **PERSONALIDAD.**

- Among the **notables** were Tom Cruise, Jim Carrey and Mike Tyson.

NOTICEABLE

NOTICEABLE means detectable (i.e. sufficient to be noticed).

- I'm very short, so a loss/gain of 5kg is very **noticeable** on me.
- The difference in processing speed is very **noticeable**.
