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<p>HAVE (Aux. Verb) TAG VERB : HAVE</p>	<p>If HAVE is used as an auxiliary verb in the statement, we use it to form the question tag. Your parents have retired, haven't they? You haven't seen this film, have you?</p>	
<p>HAVE (Main Verb) TAG VERB : DO/HAVE</p>	<p>British English - TAG VERB : DO /HAVE</p>	<p>American English - TAG VERB : DO</p>
	<p>You have a cat , don't you? You have a cat, haven't you?</p>	<p>You have enough money, don't you?</p>
<p>HAVE GOT TAG VERB : HAVE /DO HAVE GOT TO</p>	<p>British English - TAG VERB :HAVE</p>	<p>American English - TAG VERB : DO</p>
	<p>He's got a lot of money, hasn't he? You've got to go at four o'clock, haven't you?</p>	<p>He's got a lot of money, doesn't he? You've got to go at four o'clock, don't you?</p>
<p>HAVE TO TAG VERB : DO</p>	<p><u>HAVE TO</u> - TAG VERB : DO You have to go, don't you? / I don't have to do it now, do I?</p>	
<p>HAVE (causative verb) TAG VERB : HAVE (Aux.Verb) DO (Main Verb)</p>	<p><u>HAVE AS A CAUSATIVE VERB</u> HAVE as an Auxiliary verb : HAVE / HAVE as a Causative verb : DO You've had your hair cut, haven't you? (auxiliary have) He had his brother fixed his computer, didn't he? (causative have) You haven't had your secretary send me the email yet, have you? (auxiliary have) You had your secretary send me the email, didn't you? (causative have)</p>
