<ul> <li>Dead man's shoes</li> <li>A job or position that can only be taken when someone dies or leaves.</li> <li>He's waiting for a promotion, but it's a case of dead man's shoes.</li> <li>In this company, it's dead man's shoes—nobody ever leaves.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Fill someone's shoes</li> <li>To take over someone's role or responsibilities, often implying it's a big challenge.</li> <li>When the CEO retired, no one thought her replacement could fill her shoes.</li> <li>You've got some big shoes to fill, taking over as team captain.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>If the shoe fits, wear it</li> <li>If a criticism or comment applies to you, accept it.</li> <li>I didn't name anyone, but if the shoe fits, wear it.</li> <li>She got mad about the gossip, but honestly—if the shoe fits</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>In someone's shoes</li> <li>In someone else's situation or position.</li> <li>I wouldn't want to be in his shoes right now.</li> <li>If I were in your shoes, I'd probably do the same thing.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>The shoe is on the other foot</li> <li>The situation has reversed; the roles of two people have changed, especially regarding power or responsibility.</li> <li>He used to criticize her constantly, but now the shoe is on the other foot and she's the boss.</li> <li>I used to be the one always apologizing—now the shoe is on the other foot.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>To have big shoes to fill</li> <li>To replace someone who did an excellent job, creating high expectations.</li> <li>When the founder retired, the new CEO had big shoes to fill.</li> <li>He knew he had big shoes to fill when he joined the championship team.</li> </ul>
<ul> <li>Wait for the other shoe to drop</li> <li>Expecting something bad or inevitable to happen, especially after an earlier event.</li> <li>The company laid off a few employees, and now everyone's just waiting for the other shoe to drop.</li> <li>After that weird call from my landlord, I was waiting for the other shoe to drop.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Walk a mile in someone's shoes</li> <li>Understand someone else's experience or perspective before judging them.</li> <li>Don't criticize until you've walked a mile in his shoes.</li> <li>She learned to be more empathetic after trying to walk a mile in their shoes.</li> </ul>
