

# SAW SEW SOW

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## SAW

**Verb** (past tense of "see"): To have looked at or observed something.

- I saw a shooting star last night.
- He saw the accident happen right in front of him.



**Noun:** A tool used for cutting, typically with a serrated edge.

- She used a saw to cut the piece of wood in half.

**Verb:** to cut wood or other hard material using a saw.

- They sawed the door in half.

## SEW

**Verb:** To join fabric or materials together using a needle and thread.



- She learned how to sew her own clothes in high school.
- He had to sew the torn fabric back together before using it again.
- I need to sew a button on my coat before the cold weather sets in.

## SOW

**Verb:** To plant seeds in the ground for growing crops.




- In spring, farmers sow their fields with wheat.

**Verb** (figurative): To cause something to happen or develop, often something negative like doubt or conflict.

- He tried to sow discord between the two friends.

**Noun:** A female pig.

- The sow gave birth to several piglets on the farm.



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### IMPORTANT :

Sew and Sow are pronounced the same. They are homophones.

sow → /soʊ/    sew → /soʊ/

They both sound exactly like “so”. That’s why context matters:

- She taught me how to /soʊ/...” (pronounced /soʊ/)

### Only context clears it up:

- She taught me how to sew a dress.
- She taught me how to sow corn.
