VERY + NOUN

used to emphasize that you are talking exactly about one particular thing or person - synonym : actual

- He died in this very room. / I'll start at the very beginning.
- Those were his **very words**. / I'd intended to tell him that **very day**.

used to emphasise that sb/sth is the best or most suitable

- He's the very man we want.
- You're the very person we need for the job.
- How did you know this was the very thing I wanted?

FORMAL – used for emphasizing a noun – synonym: mere the very act, fact, idea, mention, notion, thought...

- The very act of speaking tired him out.
- The very fact that she agreed proves she likes you.
- The very mention of his name excited her.

used for emphasizing how important or serious something is

- The decision changed the very nature of our political system.
- Now, it seemed, his very life was in jeopardy.

used to emphasize an extreme place or time

- The hotel is located in the very heart of the city.
- We worked till the very end of the day.
- Education is at the very top of our list of priorities.

IDIOM - before/in front of somebody's (very) eyes:

while someone is watching; in somebody's presence

- Life as we know it is changing right before our very eyes.
- Miley Cyrus grew up right in front of our very eyes.
