

VERB + IT + ADJECTIVE

it + adjective + that clause or **it + adjective + to infinitive**, are commonly used to anticipate an object.

Introductory or dummy “IT” occurring as the object of a verb in the following sequence **Verb + IT + adjective + that clause or to infinitive**

The verbs that are commonly used in this structure are :

find, think, consider , and make

Examples:

- I find it disappointing **that** she gave up.
- She found it easy **to** win the match.
- I find it strange **that** she didn't go to school.
- I think it strange **to** see an elephant fly.
- We thought it fair **to** withdraw the case
- His doctor thought it best **that** he continues physiotherapy.
- He considers it quite outrageous **that** I didn't consult him.
- I consider it pointless **to** speculate as to who will run for president.
- Free movement makes it harder **to** control immigration, but it does not make it impossible **to** control it.
- I made it clear from the start **that** this was all about everyone pulling in the same direction.

This structure is also possible with -ing form objects.

- I found it strange **being** in her house.
