


The word I is the first person singular subject pronoun and it refers to the person performing the action of a verb.

- I want to go out tonight.
- Susan and I are going on holiday.
- She and I need to tell you something.
- This is the one I like.

**Me** is an **object pronoun**, and it refers to the person that the action of a verb is being done to, or to whom a preposition refers.

- She asked me to stay / He's always given me good advice.
- Between you and me, I think he cheated.
- You need to talk to Mike or me.

The confusion usually occurs when you have I/me connected to another pronoun or name with "and" or "or."

- ✓ Harry and I are friends. "Harry" and "I" are both subjects pronouns.
- X Harry and me are friends.
- ✓ Are you referring to Harry or me.
  Harry is the object of the preposition to and me is an object pronoun.
- Are you referring to Harry or I.

## There is an easy way to decide whether to use I or me:

Take out the other person, and it should be clearer.

- He told Jim and (I or me?) to arrive early.
- ★ He told I to arrive early? / 
  ✓ He told me to arrive early?
  - When you and (I or me) first met.
- When me first met you. / 

  ✓ When I first met you.
